Bit Of Ralls County History

History of Hays Creek Congregation, ninetieth Anniversary; Perry "Enterprise" August 31, 1933

The history of the beginning of this congregation is a matter of record as follows. -"Record of the Congregation or Church of Christ, known as Hays Creek Church, organized June 18, 1843, at Scott School House, by Timothy Ford and George Waters, James L. Alford, clerk." - Nine people, - Lucy Alford, Elizabeth James, J. L. Alford, J. A. Alford, Ppwhatan Bryant, Catherine Bryant, Harrison P. Haley, William Bryant and Albert O. Alford were constituted a church and became the charter members of Hays Creek congregation. During July and August of that year, (1843) four others were added. Of course all these charter members have long since gone on to the great beyond. There was one added to the church in Oct., 1844, Solomon Petty. For seven years there is no record of any additions to the church, but in 1851, at a meeting held by Led. Chas. Levah, a large number were added. (There is one record of a baptism in 1849) In the year 1852, a meeting was held by Elder Timothy Ford and seven members Form 1852 to 1855, Brother Ford preached for the were added to the church. congregation and there were frequent additions to the church. A revival was held in August, 1856, by Elder J. J. Errett and the minister Timothy Ford at which time seven more were added. The record is incomplete for the next few years, as the great Civil War was on. In Aug. and Sept. 1863 there were 2 added to the church. The next bit of record was in the year 1869, when a meeting was held by Elder S. P. Johnson in which a large number were added, a total of 44. At that time the oldest living member of the Hays Creek Church became a member. She is Mrs. Fanny Alford Liter, now living in Center. Mrs. Volumnia Alford Carroll united with the Hays Creek Church in August, 1863, just 70 years ago, and is still living although her membership was moved to Liberty church and is now in the Christian Church at Vandalia.

J. P. Alford, a brother came into the church at the same time and is still living, his membership being in Vandalia. He is still interested in Hays Creek Church and helps to keep the work going and the building in repair.

The congregation had for its first meeting place the Scott School House and later the congregation met in the Adiel church. About the year 1870, the congregation built the present meeting house, which is today in good condition. It has recently been recovered with patent water-proof shingles and re-painted and thus may continue for many years, a sanctuary for worship. Hay Creek is a historical old church and a land mark, dear to many hearts. At the time of the building of the church, James L. Alford, Thompson Alford and Isaac Rowland were Elders and G. W. Payne, James M. Rowland and G. B. Ogle, Deacons. These men were leaders of vision and took the task of over sight of the congregation seriously.

An interesting part of the record is in the fact that the church had colored members. The record of the Negro members gives only the given names as — Sarah, Joe, Jack and Ben. Following the building of the new church, the congregation grew rapidly, the years 1870, 1871, 1872 and 1873, show a large increase in membership, a total gain of about 75. A great revival came again in 1876, under the ministry of W. H. Hook, when 20 more were added to the church. During the days of the early history of the congregation, instances are on record of discipline, when members were excluded from the membership for failure to live up to the standards of the church membership. Several instances are recorded of those who apostatized.

From 1876 to 1884 there were frequent additions to the church and in 1882 Elder F. B. Corwine held a revival meeting, which strengthened and inspired the church. A meeting was held by Elder J. W. Monser in 1886, and in 1887, C. H. Winders, a home boy, assisted the pastor. R. L. Wilson held a meeting in which there were 10 added. The former ministers up to this time have passed away, but Bros. Winders and Wilson are living, the former at Indianapolis and the latter at Monroe City.

Brother Winders has, at a number of times preached and held meetings at his old home church. Besides Brother Winders, Bros. Claud E. Hill and Chas. C. Hill have gone into the ministry from the Hays Creek Church.

In Nov., 1888, Brother H. F. Davis and Brother C. H. Winders held a meeting in which 15 were added. In 1889-90 E. W. Herndon was minister of the church and was assisted by Elder J. A. Heddington in August, 1890, and a second meeting in Sept., 1891, nine were added, Brother Claud E. Hill being one of the converts.

The church called Brother J. D. Greer in 1892, and he continued as pastor for 2 years. About this time, Bros. R. D. Chinn and John Giddens preached for Hays Creek occasionally.

From 1894 to 1897 Bros. J. J. W. Miller of Pike County, III. was minister and held a number of meetings. Brother Miller was a great preacher, very eloquent and convincing in his sermons. He opposed instrumental music and organizations such as S. C. E. and Missionary societies, in the church as unscriptural.

In 1898 another meeting was held by Brother C. H. Winders at which time 14 were added to the membership. The next year, Brother F. A. Mayhall held a meeting, with fifteen additions to the membership. Brother Mayhall also served the church as pastor for some time. In the year of 1900, in November, Reverend J. H. Coil held a meeting resulting in 6 additions. The next minister was Claud F. Witty of Pike County, Ill., who was regular minister for some time and also held a meeting in November, 1901.

In 1903 Brother C. H. Winders held another meeting in Aug. with five additions to the church. The record shows one addition in 1905. In 1906 Brother J. D. Greer held a

meeting in which there were 15 added to the membership. Brother Greer held another meeting in 1907 with 13 added. In 1908 Brother J. M. Rhodes assisted Reverend Greer in a meeting with 4 additions. Brother Greer was minister here for a number of years, 1907, 1908 and 1909. In the last two years there was an increase of 17 members. Brother H. S. Mavity was called as pastor in 1910, and at regular services in April there were 5 added to the church. In 1911, Brother E. B. Redd held a meeting in September and 2 were added to the church. Reverend McMahan also preached in a short meeting with one addition. O. C. Kisor was regular pastor in 1911. Reverend Holly M. Hale was called as pastor and in 1913 was assisted in a revival by Brother McMahan with 11 additions. There is no record until the year 1920 when Evangelist B. G. Reavis held a meeting with 3 additions and later on in the same year held a second meting with 7 added.

Reverend Lee was minister in 1921, and held a meeting in August of that year. He was succeeded by his wife, who was pastor in 1922. She held a meeting in October. There is no record of a 1922 meeting. In 1923, Reverend Frank B. Ward, then of Perry held a meeting in August.

In June 1924, Brother Reavis held a third meeting. Leslie Harper, singer, with one confession. No record for 1925.

The meeting in 1926 was held be Brother M. D. Dudley with no additions.

In 1927, Brother C. H. Winders held a meeting with one addition to the church. Brother J. C. Bennett was called as pastor in the year 1928 and in the fall the meeting was held by Brother J. W. Pearson of Perry, with 8 added. Reverend Bennett has continued as pastor until the present, 1933. The next meeting was in September, 1929, also conducted by J. W. Pearson with one added.

Since that time Reverend John Golden and Brother Bennett have each held a meeting, the latter closing his meeting on account of continued rain. In this year the meeting began on Monday, August 14, conducted by Brother Pearson, his third meeting and closing on Sunday, 27, the date of the reading of this history.

The following ministers are some who have served the congregation as pastor, Elders. Henry Branstetter, J. B. Corwine, Robert Chinn, J. J. W. Miller, F. Boyd, Rufus McLeod, Claud F. Witty, J. D. Greer, H. S. Mavity, Robert Sallee, H. M. Hale, O. C. Kisor, Harold Kimes, C. Wilson, J. E. Lerton, J. A. Lee, Mrs. J. A. Lee, L. H. Otto, George E. Jones and J. C. Bennett.

An anniversary celebration was held at Hays Creek Sunday afternoon, Aug. 27, conducted by Brother Pearson, in the presence of a large congregation. This historic congregation has had a remarkable history and promises to do a great work in the future. The many friends of this church join in wishing many more years of usefulness for this good church and look forward to celebrating the centennial to 1943.
